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



UNIT PROFILE—Solano Court Reporters

Court reporters are responsible for capturing the verbatim record of court proceedings. Their work processes have come a long way from using pen and paper to take written shorthand. For many years, reporters have used stenographs (also called "writers") to type their shorthand notes. The machines have 22 keys, which can be pressed individually or, unlike a typewriter or computer keyboard, in combination. In the recent past, the machines have improved to electronically integrate with specialized software and customized dictionaries, which assist the reporter in transcribing his or her notes into an official record, called a transcript.


E-FILING COMING TO A COURT NEAR YOU!


eFiling Updates

The days of filing paper documents at courthouses in California are numbered. That's because electronic court filing, the uploading, and submission of documents to a court in electronic form, is rapidly becoming the new standard.

Electronic filing is currently available in 12 superior courts in California (Fresno, Kern, Merced, Monterey, Orange County, San Diego, San Francisco, San Luis Obispo, Santa Barbara, Santa Clara, Santa Cruz, and Stanislaus), with eFiling mandated in some or all civil case types in eight.

In total, 35 (out of 58) superior courts in California, including many of the largest courts in the state, have active electronic filing programs underway. Many counties, including Los Angeles and some smaller counties in the north of the state, will begin asking lawyers and litigants to file electronically during 2017.





Alameda Superior Court—New Postcard for Jury Summons

On September 16, 2016, the Alameda County Superior Court will begin using a new method of summoning residents to serve as jurors. Instead of an envelope containing a summons and directions, prospective jurors will now receive a postcard which indicates when and where they are to appear for jury service. The postcard doubles as a juror badge and should be brought to the courthouse. A copy of a representative postcard appears below.

The postcard directs the prospective juror to respond by using *eJuror*, an online application that is available 24 hours a day, seven days a week at www.alameda.courts.ca.gov/eJuror.

Prospective jurors without access to a computer may complete a paper form, which can be requested by calling the Jury Services Division at 510.891.6031.

The change from a summons in an envelope to a postcard summons reduces printing and postage costs by an estimated \$50,000 per year. This is another example of the Superior Court of Alameda County's efforts to reduce costs and become more efficient in response to cuts in court funding. It also reflects the expansion of our eservices to accommodate the public's interest I conducting business online, instead of in person. Additional types of jury business that can be conducted online rather than in person or by mail include postponing service to a more convenient date and resolving questions

about whether a person is qualified to serve. For more information about responding to a jury summons, please visit the court's website at

SOLANO'S COMMISSIONER DAVID HAET VOLUNTEERS AT 2016 RIO OLYMPICS



How did you spend your summer vacation? Commissioner David Haet attended his fifth Olympic games, this time in Rio. He was assigned to the languages services unit at the Velodrome, an arena for cycling on steeply banked ovals tracks, to trans-late for Spanish-speaking athletes at press inter-views. He was also assigned to the protocol unit, assisting members of the International Olympic Committee (IOC), the National Olympic Committee (NOC), and VIPs, such as Anne, Princess Royal of Great Britain; Albert II, Prince of Monaco; and Thom-as Bach, president of the IOC. In previous Olympics, Comm. Haet served in the security unit and was a driver for VIPs. He stayed the first night on board the Norwegian Getaway, a 4,000-passenger ship and then moved to his assigned hotel in the center of Rio, a 2-

hour commute, by train, from the Olympic village, making his day 6:00 a.m.—11:00 p.m. How-ever, he still had time to attend events: boxing, track and field, men's diving, the Sweden vs Brazil women's soccer game, the triathlon at Copacabana, women's bicycling, and trips to Ipanema and the Christ the Redeemer statue. He saw the closing ceremonies and said they were breathtaking. With 100,000 athletes and spectators leaving after the games, the mayor of Rio declared a holiday. Comm. Haet plans to be a volunteer at the 2018 Winter Olympics in South Korea and the 2020 Summer Olympics in Tokyo.


"The leginfo website will remain available to serve as an archive of California's legislative information (1993 through November, 2016).

Senate Bill 1046

SB 1046, Hill. Driving under the influence: ignition interlock device.

Californians arrested for driving under the influence will have to temporarily install breathalyzers in their vehicles to get their driver slicenses back, Starting in 2019, first-time DUI offenders would be required to install an ignition interlock device for six months to reinstate their full driving privileges. The penalty goes up from there: a year for a second offense, two years for a third offense, and three years for a fourth or subsequent offense.

Under current law, drivers convicted of a DUI face a mandatory suspension before they can apply again for a restricted license that allows for driving only to and from work and alcohol treatment programs. SB 1046 would offer first-time offenders who did not injure anyone the option to continue under this model instead with a restricted license for one year.

DMV Memo - Three Feet for Safety Update

MEMO: 16-06

SUBJECT: THREE FEET FOR SAFETY

ACT UPDATE

Memo Date: October 12, 2016

Purpose To notify courts that effective immediately, abstracts can be submitted electronically to the Department of Motor Vehicles (DMV) for convictions related to violations of bicycle safety provisions established per the "Three Feet for Safety Act". Effective September 16, 2014, legislation established the following California Vehicle Code (CVC) sections: CVC §21760(b) – unsafe passing of bicyclist; CVC §21760(c) – unsafe passing within 3 feet of bicyclist; and CVC §21760(d) – unsafe speed while passing bicyclist.

Background: Previously, courts were instructed to submit hard copy abstracts for convictions of CVC §§21760(b), (c), and (d) to DMV's Abstracts Processing Unit for updating.

New Information: Courts shall now electronically report convictions of CVC §§21760(b), (c), and (d) to DMV. This memo supersedes the previous Court Information Memo 14-01, dated September 15, 2014.

He said that he didn't want to get caught again on the phone and that an officer had just passed him by on the highway. And yes, you guessed it, he was cited for talking on his cell phone while driving for the case he was contesting.... Believe it or Not!

"Help! Where do I file my lawsuit????»



It's no secret that more and more litigants are representing themselves in their court cases without the assistance of an attorney. Many of these Self-Represented Litigants (SRL) have no idea where to begin when filing a law-If your court receives public inquiries such as this from members of the public, you can provide them with a quick answer by directing them to view the courts' "Find my Court" feature provided on the California Courts website. Once the person goes to the website, they simply have to enter the zip code based upon one or more of the following:

- The person you are suing lives or does business (if you are suing a business or organization); or
- The dispute arose, like where an accident happened, or where a contract was entered into or bro-
